PREFACE

Newspapers report with cruel fraquency the spisodes of Surns in woman. The episode may be a 'death by design', 'a cry for help' from a suffering woman or a matter of 'sheer carelessness', the outcome is equally grave in terms of the physical and psycho-social morbidity and high mortality resulting from the episodes.

A visit to the Surns ward in any general hospital would stir a person with human concern looking at the plight of woman with Surns. Why do woman choose to submit to flemss? What is responsible for the accident? What needs to be done to prevent these untimely, unnatural deaths and the miseries of physio-psycho social morbidities in those who survive the episodes?

Burns is a serious problem in terms of its magnitude and psychosocial consequences, irrespective of it being homicidal, suicidal or accidental in nature. The culture born symptomatology, the pressure of social norms and traditions, the accid-sconomic status and the life-style of the victims of Burns must be studied, for a rational action plan to follow. Hence the study.
