On my way to this PhD, I have many people to express my gratitude, as each one of them have inspired and filled me in with new learning and a fresher perspective. PhD is a very rigorous and contemplative study which goes like a roller coaster. There were many ups and downs in this journey. Because PhD is not one-dimensional studies. It is a multi-dimensional study. There were days and weeks together when I couldn't think straight. It was so confusing. My everyday's motto had been 'keep at it and persevere by improving'. I read a lot and attended many seminars related to my subject to gain perspective. And it continues to this date. Because learning is a never-ending process.

To begin with; Prof. (Dr.) M.N. Parmar my mentor and guide with his ever smiling and welcoming mannerisms, had graciously accepted me as a PhD Scholar. He has a way with words and conveys them in a very positive manner respecting the sensitivities. He has boisterous, loud, rhythmic laugh which suits his personality.
