## CHAPTER-VI

## FINANCING OF HIGHER EDUCATION

In Chapter III an attempt was made to study the trends in public expenditure on Higher Education, while in Chapter V we examined the expenditure pattern of College students in Tamil Nadu. In this chapter, we propose to analyse the financing of Higher Education in Tamil Nadu with reference to:

- 1) Sources of finance for Higher Education, and
- 2) Estimates of financing by sources.

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## 1) Sources of Finance

The sources of finance for higher education fall chiefly into two categories, namely (a) Private, and

(b) Public (or Social).

A) <u>Private</u>: Let us examine private financing first. The sources of private financing are parents, relatives: (brothers and sisters), guardians, 'others' (including friends and well-wishers) and 'self'.

Parents are the chief source of finance fo college students in Tamil Nadu and in India. Faculty-wise 90% men and 94% Women students of General Higher Education, and 93% men and 88% women students of Professional Education depended on their parents' income for Higher Education.

Relatives (brothers and sisters) financed 6 and 4 per cent men and women, respectively, of General Education, and 4 and 7 per cent men and women, each of Professional Education.

Guardians, including relatives other than brothers. and sisters, financed 2.5% men and 1.6% women of General. Education and 2% and 4% men. and women, each of Professional Education.

Others, namely, friends, well-wishers, private college managements and charitable trusts financed 1% and 0.4% men and women of General Education, and 1% each of men and women students of Professional Education.

In the entire sample population of 1274 under graduates, only 2 students financed their education through work.

This dominant dependence on parental incomes for university education stands in sharp contrast with the position in advanced countries where merit scholarships and opportunities for work are responsible for financing

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the education of the bulk of their graduates.<sup>1</sup> Table VI-(1) presents the sources of private financing of higher education with the number and percentage of students depending upon each source.

B) <u>Public</u>: The alternative to private financing is. public (social) or government financing.

The Government of Tamil Nadu finances economically and socially backward students through its wellestablished schemes of scholarships. The educational subsidy or concession granted by the state/central Government to the children of the Backward Classes! Scheduled Castes' and Scheduled Tribes' parents for pursuing higher education is known as Scholarships.<sup>2</sup>

Scholarships are either non-refundable educational grants or refundable loans. In the former case, they are known as Scholarships, while in the latter case they are called Loan Scholarships.

Day-scholars are eligible for non-residential scholarships while hostel residents can have a course to residential scholarships.

Scholarships are based either on caste and income or caste and merit. By caste and income we mean that.

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the annual income of the parents of the eligible castes should not exceed the prescribed income limit.

By caste and merit we mean that the candidates of the particular caste to be eligible for scholarship should have secured the prescribed percentage of marks at the Secondary School Leaving Certificate (S.S.L.C.), or Pre-University or equivalent Examinations.

The scholarship amount does not cover all the expenses of the residential or non-residential student. Separate amounts are given for the payment of college fees, purchase of books and in the case of residential students, for paying hostel fees. Students of Professional Education in addition, get an extra subsidy for the purchase of equipments.

Colleges and Hostels who forgo the collection of fees due to the granting of government scholarships are compensated in full by the government. The financial burden of the student is borne by the Government.

There are three important Scholarships Schemes. operating in Tamil Nadu, namely:

- 1) National Scholarships Scheme,
- 2) National Scholarship to the children of teachers, and
- 3) National Loan Scholarship Scheme.

## Scheduled Caste/Scheduled Tribe

The Directorate of Harijan and Tribal Welfare, Government of Tamil Nadu, Madras, disburses scholarships to Scheduled Caste and Scheduled Tribe students studying in recognized educational institutions.<sup>3</sup>

According to the 1971 census, 18% of the population of Tamil Nadu consisted of Scheduled Caste and Scheduled Tribe communities. Scheduled Caste and Scheduled Tribe students are eligible for either state or central Government scholarships at the Pre-University and Graduate levels of higher education. To be eligible for scholarships, the following conditions. should be fulfilled:

- 11) The candidate should have secured at least the prescribed minimum of marks at the S.S.L.C./ Pre-University or equivalent examination;
- 2) The candidate should not be over 20 years of age at the Pre-University level;
- 3) The candidate should not be over 21/22/23 years of age at the I/II/III Degree Course; and
- 4.) The annual income of the parents of the candidate should not exceed Rs. 2,500/-. $\frac{4}{2}$

Scheduled Caste and Scheduled Tribe students are eligible for either residential (if, reside in college hostels) or non-residential (if, day-scholars) scholarships. The rates of scholarships vary accordingly. The rates of residential and non-residential scholarships are given below:

- Note From 1977-78, full fee concession is given in Degree courses and above to all Scheduled Caste and Tribe students irrespective of the annual income of their parents. The income limit of Rs. 2500/- per annum has been removed.

## Book Allowance

In addition to the above scholarships, all residential and non-residential students also get an allowance of R. 50/- towards the purchase of books per year.

## Fees.

S.C./S.T. candidates are exempted from paying, college tuition fees. They, however, have to pay, college special fees.

## Fees

S.C./S.T. candidates are exempted from paying college tuition fees. They, however, have to pay college special fees.

## Backward classes:

The Directorate of Backward classes, Government of Tamil Nadu, Madras, grants Scholarships to students of backward class communities studying in recognized educational institutions.<sup>5</sup> 54% of the population of Tamil Nadu consisted of backward class communities. Backward class students are eligible for state government scholarships at the Pre-University and Graduate levels of higher education. The conditions for eligibility for the grant of scholarships are:

- The candidate should have secured at least the prescribed minimum of marks at the S.S.L.C./Pre-University or equivalent examination;
- The candidate should be within the prescribed age limit;
- 3) The annual income of the parents of the candidate should not exceed Rs. 2500/- and
- 4) The candidate should be a member of one of the backward class communities eligible for the grant of State Government Scholarships.

Backward class students are eligible for either residential or non-residential scholarships. The rates of scholarships are given below:

## Non-Residential Scholarships:

The rates of non-residential scholarships wary according to the recipient's eligibility to receive either a No-Fee rate or a Half-Fee rate scholarship. In the case of the former, the recipient does not pay college tuition fees. He has to pay only the college special fees. The scholarship amount is for meeting the expenses towards college special fees and the cost of books and stationery. In the latter case, the recipient has to pay part of the college tuition fees plus the special fees. The scholarship amount is for meeting these expenses on college tuition and special fees plus the cost of books and stationery.

The rates of Non-residential scholarships for students of General Education are as follows:

The non-residential scholarships are granted to students of professional education towards the cost of college tuition and special fees, books, stationery and equipment.

### Loan Scholarships

Both Scheduled Caste/Scheduled Tribe and Backward Class students are also eligible for Loan Scholarships. The loan has to be repaid one year after the candidate has begun to earn an income. The average amount of loan per recipient is Rs.565/- for General Education and Rs.800/- for Professional Education.

Note - The rates of Non-Residential Scholarships for General Education are per year. The rates of Non-Residential Scholarships for Professional Education are different for each year. The Scholarships are given year by year. The amount mentioned here is the Total for the whole course. The total number of scholarships sanctioned by the Government of Tamil Nadu under the three scholarships schemes of National Scholarships, National Scholarships to the children of teachers and National Loan Scholarships from 1970-71 to 1976-77 is given in Table Number VI - (3).

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School Education, Collegerate Education and Technical Education. Government of Tamil Nadu, Madras, March 1979. Besides the above mentioned three National Scholarships Schemes administered by the Government of Tamil Nadu, certain other scholarships are also awarded to students. Mention may be made here of the "Ad Hoc: Merit Grants" given to students belonging to Scheduled Castes and Tribes who have passed in first class the Pre-University or obtained 60 per cent or above in S.S.L.C. (Secondary School Leaving Certificate). The Merit Grant is awarded at the rate of Rs.300/- per student per year for both Pre-University as well as Degree Classes.

The scholarships awarded by the State or Central Government, by and large, go to benefit the socially and economically backward students belonging to the scheduled caste, scheduled tribe and backward classes. Economically backward students belonging to the forward class communities are assisted by private scholarships given by private Management Colleges or by Charitable Trusts.

Thus we have three main sources of scholarships and loan scholarships, namely, State Government Scholarships, Central Government Scholarships and Private Management or Trusts' Scholarships. Table VI-(4) gives the number of the above mentioned three types of scholarships and loan scholarships according to the faculties. From the table we find that 69% of the scholarships recipients of the sample population receive State Government Scholarships as against 19% by the Central Government and 12% by Private sources. Similarly, 34% of the recipients of loan scholarships are assisted by State Government loans, as against 43% by the Central Government and 23% by Private sources. TABLE - VI (4)

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## 2) Estimates of Financing by Sources:

Table VI - (5) and VI - (6) give the number and percentage of scholarships and loan scholarships recipients and the annual amount of Scholarships and Loan Scholarships per recipient in rupees according to the courses of education of the sample population.

We find that 43% men and 33% women of General Education are recipients of scholarships as against 51% men and 43% women of Professional Education.

Similarly, while only 6% men and 5% women of General Education received loan scholarships, 20% men and 10% women of Professional Education received loan scholarships.

Taking an overall picture of Scholarships and Loan Scholarships, we observe that 49% men and 38% women of General Education were recipients of scholarships and loan scholarships as against 72% men and 52% women of Professional Education.

The average annual amount of scholarships per day-scholar was Rs.340/- and Rs.778/- per male recipient of General and Professional Education, respectively, as against Rs.446/- and Rs.800/- each per female recipient. The corresponding figures for hostel residents were Rs.635/- and Rs.923/- per male recipient of General and Professional Education, respectively, as against Rs.643/- and Rs.895/- each per female recipient.

The corresponding figures of loan scholarships for day-scholars were Rs.544/- and Rs.817/- per male

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recipient of General and Professional Education, respectively, as against Rs.559/- and Rs.717/- each per female recipient. The corresponding figures for hostel residents were Rs.596/- and Rs.778/- per male\_recipient of: General and Professional Education, respectively, as against Rs.683/- and Rs.900/- each per female recipient.

Thus, both in terms of percentage and actual amount of money received, whether in the case of scholarships or loan scholarships, with reference to dayscholars or hostel residents, men or women, students of professional education faculties received a larger share of financial aid than their counter parts in general education. Tables VI - (7) and VI - (8) show the number of students, number of scholarships' recipients, number of scholarships and loan scholarships' recipients, total annual expenditure, total annual scholarships amount, total annual scholarships plus loan scholarships amount, and the actual annual out-of-pocket expenditure per student after deducting scholarships/ scholarships plus loan scholarships.

## Caste, Parents' Monthly Income and Scholarships

At this point we may raise the obvious question as to how far the scholarships and loan scholarships schemes of the Government have benefited the socially and economically backward students in pursuing higher education? An attempt is, therefore, made in the subsequent pages of this chapter to analyse this issue with reference to the caste and parents' monthly income of the scholarships' recipients.

students belonged to the scheduled caste/scheduled tribe (S.C./S.T.) communities. They were distributed as follows:-General higher education - 57 men and 27 women, and Professional higher education - 27 men and 8 women.

## Parents' monthly income

The income-wise distribution of the S.C./S.T. candidates were as follows:-

## General Higher Education:

Below Rs.120/- per month income:
19 men (33.5%) and 9 women (33.5%),
Rs.120/ Rs.400/- per month income:
19 men (33.5%) and 9 women (33.5%),
Rs.400/ Rs.1000/- per month inco:
15 men (26%) and 6 women (22%), and
Rs.1000/- and above per month income:
4 men (7%) and 3 women (11%).

## Professional Higher Education:

Below Rs.120/- per month income:
6 men (22%) and 2 women (25%).
Rs.120/ Rs.400/- per month income:
13 men (48%) and 4 women (50%).
Rs.400/ Rs.1000/- per month income:
7 men (26%) and 1 woman (12.5%), and
Rs.1000/- and above per month income:
1 man (4%) and 1 woman (12.5%).

## Scholarships

All the S.C./S.T. candidates, irrespective of

their incomes, were recipients of either Central or State Government scholarships.

## Backward Classes:

Out of the total sample population of 1274 students, 663 students belonged to the Backward Class (B.C.) communities, that is, 52%. They were distributed as follows:-

General Higher Education - 378 men and 132 women, Professional Higher Education - 109 men and 44 women.

## Parents' monthly income

The income-wise distribution of the B.C. candidates were as follows:-

### General Higher Education:

Below Rs.120/- per month income: 58 men (15%) and 20 women (15%), Rs.120/- - Rs.400/- per month income: 167 men (44%) and 48 women (36%), Rs.400/- - Rs.1000/- per month income: 106 men (28%) and 43 women (33%), and Rs.1000/- and above per month income: 47 men (13%) and 21 women (16%).

## Professional Higher Education:

Below Rs.120/- per month income: 13 men (12%) and 2 women (4%), Rs.120/- - Rs.400/- per month income: 36 men (33%) and 11 women (25%),

Rs.400/- - Rs.1000/- per month income: 27 men (25%) and 17 women (39%), and Rs.1000/- and above per month income: 33 men (30%) and 14 women (32%).

## Scholarships

All the candidates belonging to the below Rs.120/per month income group of both general and professional education, men and women, were recipients of scholarships.

Of the Rs.120/- - Rs.400/- per month income group, 86% men (144/167) and 88% women (42/48) of general education and cent percent men (36/36) and women (11/11) of professional education received scholarships.

Of the Rs.400/- - Rs.1000/- per month income group, 33% men (9/27) and 71% women (12/17) of professional education were recipients of scholarships. There were no scholarship holders among the general education candidates in this income group.

In the income group of Rs.1000/- and above per month, there were no scholarship recipients among the general education and professional education candidates.

## "Others" (Forward caste students)

492 out of 1274 candidates, that is 39%, belonged to the "Others", that is, candidates belonging to communities other than the reserved communities of S.C./ S.T. and B.C. In common parlance, they are known as Forward Caste communities. They were distributed as follows:- General higher education - 252 men and 152 women. Professional higher education - 51 men and 37 women.

## Parents' monthly income

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The income-wise distribution of 'Others' were as follows:-

## General Higher Education:

Below Rs.120/- per month income:
9 men (3%) and 3 women (2%).
Rs.120/ Rs.400/- per month income:
57 men (23%) and 30 women (20%),
Rs.400/ Rs.1000/- per month income:
121 men (48%) and 61 women (40%), and
Rs.1000/- and above per month income:
65 men (26%) and 58 women (38%).

## Professional Higher Education:

Below Rs.120/- per month income:
2 men (4%) and no woman,
Rs.120/ Rs.400/- per month income:
5 men (10%) and 3 women (8%),
Rs.400/ Rs.1000/- per month income:
19 men (37%) and 12 women (32%), and
Rs.1000/- and above per month income:
25 men (49%) and 22 women (60%).

## Scholarships

All the students belonging to the below Rs.120/per month income group of both general and professional education, men and women, were recipients of scholarships (private). Of the Rs.120/- - Rs.400/- per month income group, 46% men (26/57); and 37% women (11/30) of general education and cent percent men (5/5) and women (3/3) of professional education received scholarships (private).

Of the Rs.400/- - Rs.1000/- per month income group, there were no scholarship holders among the general education candidates, while 21% men (4/19) and 8% women (1/12) of professional education were recipients of scholarships (private).

There were no scholarship recipients among the general education and professional education candidates in the income group of Rs.1000/- and above per month.

## Loan Scholarships

Students who were not eligible for State or Central Government scholarships, due to reasons of caste or income or both, could however, have recourse to loan scholarships. Altogether 105 students received loan scholarships from the following 3 sources, namely, 32 State Government loan scholarships, 41 Central Government loan scholarships and 32 Prizzate sources loan scholarships. Faculty-wise, they were distributed as follows:-

General Education:

44 men and 14 women,

Professional Education:

38 men and 9 women.

Caste-wise, they were distributed thus:-

General Education:

men - 25 B.C. and 19 '\$thers', and
women - 3 B.C. and 11 'Others'

Professional Education:

men - 27 B.C. and 111 'Others', and women - 5 B.C. and 4 'Others'.

The detailed break-up of scholarships recipients according to caste and parents! monthly income is given in Table number VI - (9).

Table number VI - (10) shows the number of scho-. larships and loan scholarships recipients according to caste only.

Table number VI - (11) gives the number and percentage of scholarships and loan scholarships recipients according to the parents' monthly income (All castes combined).

## Conclusion:

The above analysis of the distribution of scholarships and loan scholarships according to caste and parents' monthly income, highlights the following points:-

- Higher education in Tamil Nadu is highly subsidized through the government's schemes of National Scholarships and Loan Scholarships.
- 2) All the students belonging to the S.C./S.T. communities, irrespective of income, are recipients of government scholarships.
- 3) The lower income brackets of the B.C. Community have benefited from the scholarship schemes of the government.

4.) Private Scholarships help the lower income groups

of the 'Other' castes.

5) 57% (60/105) of loan scholarships benefit the B.C. Students as against 43% (45/105) loan scholarships benefiting the 'Other' castes.

- Faculty-wise, we observe that as income in-6) creases, the percentage of scholarships recipients among the B.C. and 'Others' castes decrease at a faster rate among general educattion students than professional education students. Thus, for instance, while all the students of professional education belowing to the below Rs.120/- and Rs.120/- - Rs.400/- per month income groups are recipients of scholarships, among general education students cent percent scholarships are received only by those belonging to the below Rs. 120/- per month income . group. That is to say, professional education. in Tamil Nadu is much more subsidized than general education.
- 7) In both general and professional education, the percentage of men students who received scholarships are higher than that of women.
