

CHAPTER 5

CONTENT CATEGORIZATION AND RANKING OF LIS BLOGS

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The content analysis of the LIS blogosphere began with a general categorizing of the LIS blogs into broad and specific subject categories. The population for this study was derived from Walt Crawford's *The Liblog landscape 2007-2010* (2011). Crawford had divided 1303 blogs into 4 groups based on their activity during March-May 2010, with Group 1 (443 blogs) as mentioned in Chapter 4, being the most active and visible during the period of study. Group 1 formed the sample for this study. The study of the blog content data has been presented, analyzed and interpreted in three sections, viz., LIS Blog Subject Categorization, Longevity of Blogs, and LIS Blog Ranking. Lastly a summary of the major interpretations are presented.

5.1 LIS Blog Subject Categorization

Each blog was visited during April - June 2012 to collect data for subject categorizing. The following tables and figures give statistical information about the specific subject categories derived as well as broad subject categories formed. It was found that out of 434 in Group 1, 100 blogs had discontinued their activity. A total of 343 operational blogs from the Group 1 of Walt Crawford's work formed the sample for the study. The blog post was taken as the unit of the study.

A thorough analysis of the blog content from the ‘about’ section of the blog and the tags/categories listed on the blogs resulted in fifty four specific (54) subject categories. These 54 subject categories have been listed in Table 5.1 in an alphabetical order.

Some library blogs are more expert-oriented with a focused subject. Specific subjects with a narrow focus such as, library etiquette, library design, library grants, library history, green libraries, etc. exist along with blogs with wider focus areas such as technologies, libraries and collection development on the library blogosphere.

These specific subject categories were further clustered into eleven broad subject categories. The broad subject categories formed are Collection Development, Emerging Technologies, Ethics, Information Science, Knowledge Organization & Processing, Libraries, Library Management, LIS Study & Research, Multi-topical, Preservation and Services. These subject categories are shown in Table 5.2 along with the number of blogs categorized in each category.

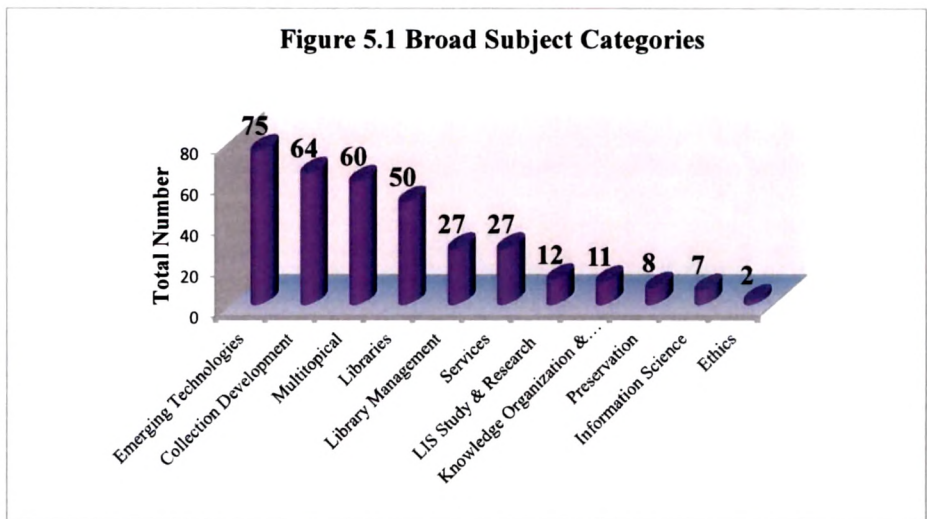

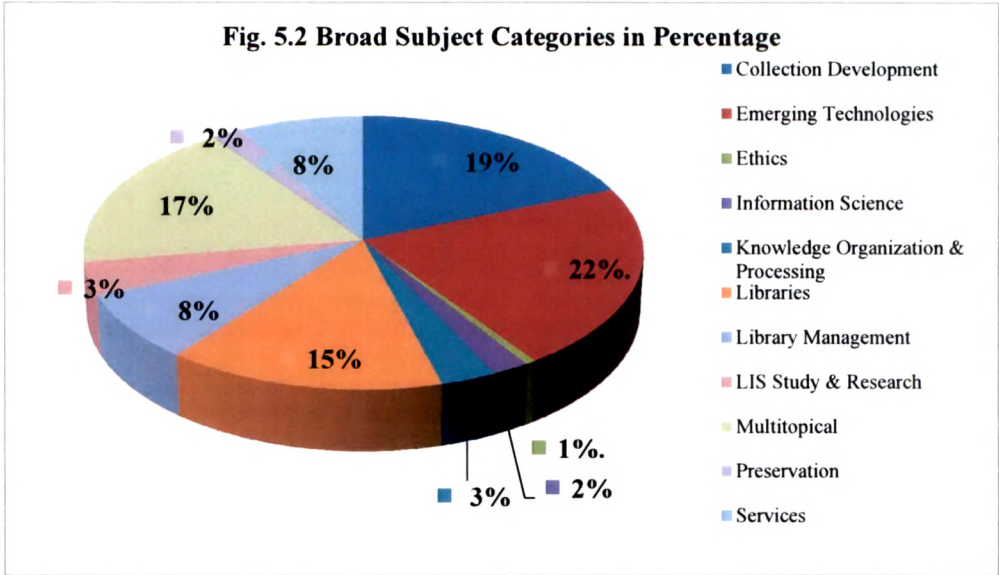
The largest number of blogs (75) belong to the broad subject category Emerging Technologies followed by Collection Development (64), Multi-topical (60), Libraries (50), Library Management (27), Services (27), LIS Study & Research (12), Knowledge Processing & Management (11), Preservation (8), Information Science (7) and lastly Ethics (2). Figure

5.1 illustrates the broad subject categories arranged according to the ascending order of the total number of blogs in each broad subject category.



The broad subject category of Emerging technologies has blogs of specific subject categories such as green libraries, technology education and open source - Linux, and technologies being applied to libraries. The specific subject category of Technologies incorporates various sub-themes such as library automation, software programming and development, web searching and search engines, World Wide Web, cloud infrastructure, linked data, big data, Library 2.0, Web 2.0, semantic web and social networking.

The second largest subject category Collection Development (19%) shown in Figure 5.2, signifies a large presence of book review blogs. A total of 75% (48 out of 66 blogs) of the collection development blogs are book review blogs. There are review blogs focusing on - young adult (YA) literature, children, comics & manga, mysteries, awful, romance, horror, historical, movies, TV shows, music, nonfiction, YouTube videos, antiquarian, steam punk, as well as science fiction.



Blogs which had content belonging to more than one subject was placed under the broad subject category of Multi-topical (17%) which formed the third largest category. The fourth largest broad subject category of Libraries (155) has blogs belonging to various sub themes such as academic, school, public and special libraries such as law, medical, news and religious libraries

The following Table 5.3 entitled Expanded Subject Categories shows the list of specific subject categories which have been clustered within a broad subject category. A scope note has been added for each broad subject category. Along with the total number of blogs in each broad subject category, the number of blogs in a specific subject category is also displayed. A complete list of blogs with their names and URL's along with the subject categories assigned by the researcher is shown in Appendix C.

As seen in the above table the broad subject category Collection Development has a vast majority of book review blogs (49) followed by blogs on open access, e-books and digital libraries. Similarly in the broad subject category Emerging Technologies majority of the blogs are focusing on technologies (59), followed by blogs on technology education (14). The Knowledge Organization & Processing sees a sharp contrast of ten (10) blogs on cataloguing and one (1) on classification. The blog on classification *025.431: The Dewey blog* is authored by the editor-in-chief of Dewey Decimal Classification and other contributors. A majority of blogs (60) which are discussing multiple topics on the same blog were given the tag Multi-topical.

The broad subject categories of Libraries and Library Management have many sub divisions as shown in the above table (Table 5.3). The subject category Libraries has ten specific subject categories and Library Management has fifteen specific subjects embedded within it. Services has seven specific subjects within it, with maximum number of blogs numbering nine (9) on information literacy followed by six (6) blogs on reference interview.

5.2 Longevity of LIS Blogs

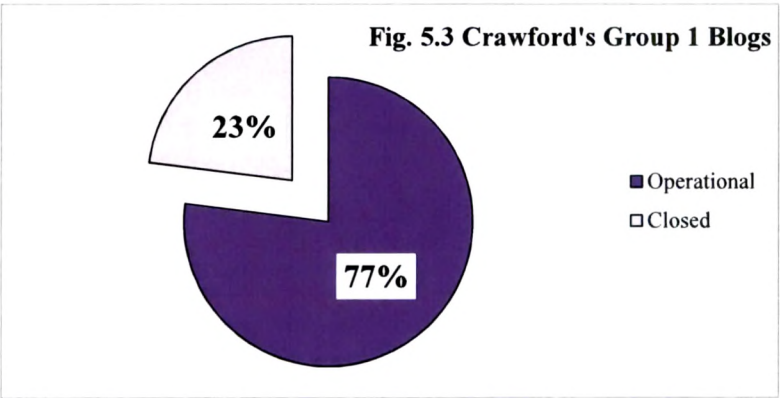
Blogs as a personal medium of communication have sustained themselves on the Internet for a more than a decade. Blogs were considered to be a fleeting Web 2.0 technology, which would be replaced with the next such improved venture. With the advent of micro blogging sites such as Twitter, the Web 2.0 world predicted an early death of the blogging phenomenon. On the contrary the 2010 edition of *Technorati State of the Blogosphere* finds blogs in transition and states:

Blogs are no longer an upstart community, now with influence on mainstream narratives firmly entrenched, with bloggers still searching for the next steps forward. Bloggers’ use of and engagement with various social media tools is expanding, and the boundaries between blogs, micro-blogs, and social networks are disappearing. As the blogosphere converges with social media, sharing of blog posts is increasingly done through social networks—even while blogs remain significantly more influential on blog content than social networks are. (Technorati, 2010)

In the following year the status study further added,

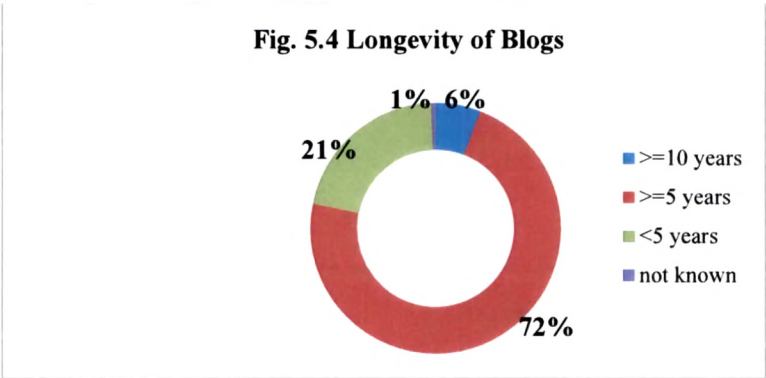
We are seeing bloggers updating their blogs more frequently and spending more time blogging. The type of information influencing blogging has shifted from conversations with friends, which was the primary influence in 2010, to other blogs, which for 68% of bloggers are having more of an influence in 2011. (Technorati, 2011)

Johnson (2008) had found that, “the nature of blogs is ephemeral in that the content is closely tied to the time period of the posting”. Crawford’s Group 1 blogs averaged a lifespan of 51 months (with a median of 48 months). As stated earlier, the list of blogs in the Group 1 also known as the core blogs - was taken as the population for this study. Crawford’s sample from March-May 2010 was revisited by the researcher in May 2012. As stated earlier, it was found that 100 blogs out of 443 had closed down. Figure 5.3 shows that 343 blogs (77%) of the Group 1 blogs were still operational and 23%



had closed down. Thus on an average three percent (3%) blogs have closed down annually. In July 2012 Crawford also posted a list of moribund and closed blogs. This list included all the 1303 blogs which Crawford had analyzed.

The universe of blogs studied shows an impressive list of blogs, which started as early as 1995 and have continued till date. The study reveals that 72% blogs are showing a lifespan of 5 years and more, whereas only 21% of blogs are showing a lifespan of less than 5 years as shown in Figure 5.4. It was difficult to find out the number of active years for two blogs as no archive option was available. In blogs where direct access to archives was not available, the researcher was able to decipher the age of the blog by going to the oldest post. But in these two cases it was not possible.



A special mention has to be made of the 6% of blogs which have survived a decade on the LIS blogosphere. The oldest blogs are those which have survived for ten or more years on the LIS Blogosphere. The oldest library blog from this group of 343 blogs is Jenny Levine’s blog *The Librarians Site du Jour* from 1995 to 1999 (<http://jennyscybrary.lishost.org/pastjour.html>). Currently she is hosting the blog *The Shifted Librarian*, where the archive of her earlier blog is still available. As of May 2011 there are no new posts on her blog, although her website shows an active tweet stream. *Research Buzz* started in 1996 as stated on the blog is the second oldest LIS blog started by Tara Calishain.

The third oldest blog begun by Jessamyn West *librarian.net* was started in September 1999. It is to be noted that all the three bloggers are women who have been blogging independently. The *ALA TechSource Blog* began in 1999 but discontinued thereafter. Subsequently the blog was restarted in September 2005. Table 5.4 shows the list of blogs which are equal to and more than a decade old.

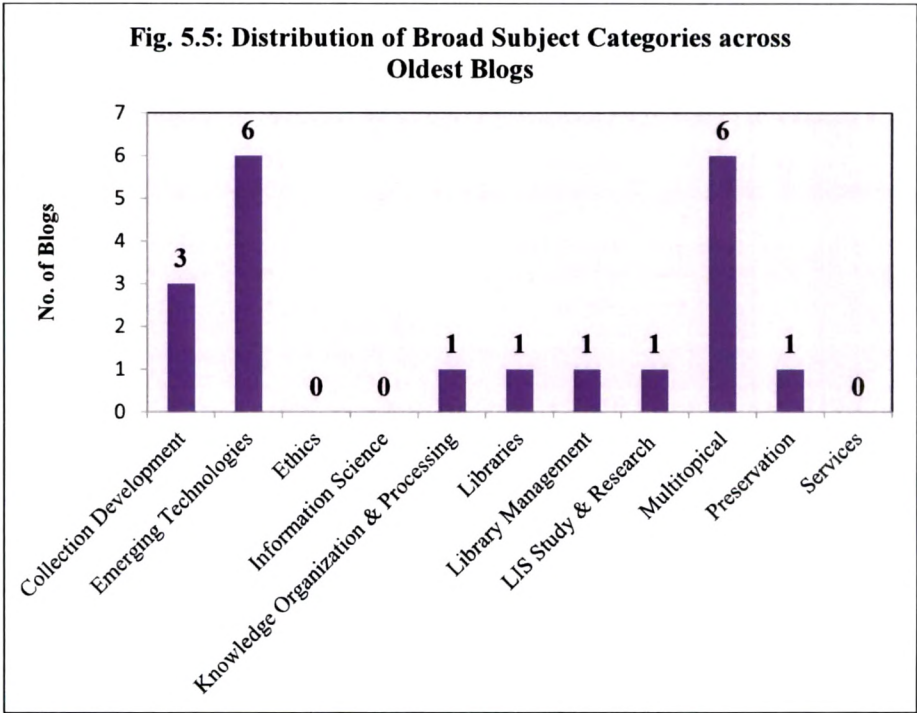
Blogging requires commitment in terms of time and effort on the part of the blogger to continue posting on topics of interest over years. These blogs as shown in Table 5.5 represent oldest blogs found in each broad subject categories derived by the researcher except the broad subject categories of Ethics, Information Science and Services.

It has been observed that over a period of time, the subject of some blogs had also changed. The focus of the blog *Frontier librarian* changed from Multi-topical to Preservation.

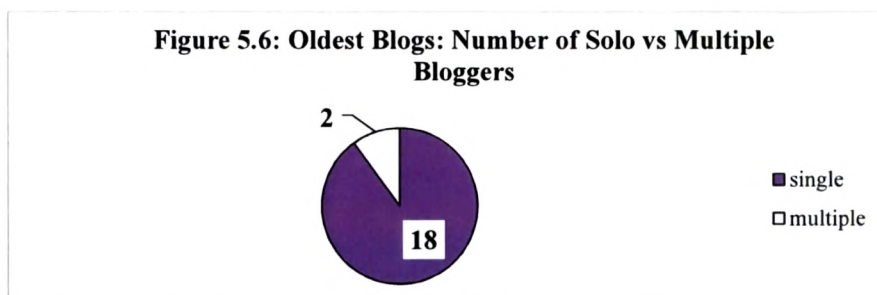
Figure 5.5 shows the distribution of oldest blogs across broad subject categories, with their lifespan ranging from 10 to 16 years.



The highest number of blogs belong to Multi-topical (6), Emerging Technologies (6), followed by Collection development (3). Knowledge Organization and Processing, Libraries, Library Management, Preservation, LIS Study and Research have one blog each. The perpetually changing technologies have been captured by the domain of blogs belonging to the subject category Emerging Technologies.

5.2.1 Oldest Blogs: Profile Statistics

Among the oldest blogs, eighteen bloggers have sustained their blogging activity as solo (single) bloggers, whereas two blogs are authored by multiple bloggers as displayed in Figure 5.6.



The following Table 5.6 shows the name and year of the blogs with the blogger profile.

5.2.2 Oldest Blogs: Gender Statistics

As can be seen in Table 5.7, 18 (90%) blogs of the total of 20 oldest blogs were written by single authors. It is further found that 10 blogs out of these 18 oldest blogs are written by women (F) and 8 blogs are written by men (M).

Table 5.8 shows that of the 2 blogs authored by multiple bloggers, the total number of contributing bloggers is 08. Of these eight (8) bloggers, five (05) are women (F) bloggers, whereas three (03) are men (M) bloggers.

*The blogs *The Shifted Librarian* show discontinuity in the blogging activity, but has an active presence on Twitter since 2011. After May 2012 the blog *The Handheld Librarian* showed a post in October 2013 after a gap of five months. As there are more than six months left in 2013 these blogs may still show some activity in the latter part of the year.

5.2.3 Oldest Blogs: Staying Connected

These blogs are also offering various tools for staying connected and encouraging users to share their blog content. Table 5.11 displays the several options offered by the blogger to the readers to stay updated and to share blog content.

There are many options available to the blogger as well as the reader to stay connected to newly updated content on the blog. Bloggers stay connected to share updates, opinions or enter into discussions on specific blog posts of interest. RSS Feeds remain the most popular tool offered by the bloggers to the readers to subscribe to their blog content followed by Email and Twitter with sixteen blogs (80%) offering RSS feed subscriptions on their blogs. Eleven blogs (55%) facilitate access to their blog content through E-mail followed by Twitter being used by 10 blogs. The blog *The Shifted Librarian* shows a shift to tweeting from blogging which is an example of bloggers' adaptability of newer technologies.

5.3 LIS Blogs Ranking

Links form an integral part of blog content, thus the researcher further counted the number of links present on each blog. The sample for this study as stated earlier was the 343 operational blogs (Out of 443 Group 1 Blogs, 100 had closed down) from Crawford's Group 1. Crawford had specified Group 1 blogs as, "These blogs must have Google Page Rank of 4 or higher and must have at least three posts between March 1, 2010 and May 31, 2010" (Crawford, 2011, p. 26). Thirty four percent blogs out of 1304 (Crawford's total sample) fell into this group. The data for the present study was collected from 8th December 2012 to 19th December 2012. Out of 343 blogs, data for 20 blogs was not collected due to the following reasons:

- 8 blogs - officially closed with URL given away
- 5 blogs - no post over a year
- 3 blogs - sites inaccessible
- 3 blogs - did not generate link count data
- 1 blog - live journal- no link data

Links are given to other related content, articles published, videos, slide share presentations, older content from the same blog, for conference alerts, and many other reasons. Links are also used by the bloggers to attract traffic to the blog.

Thus the links of 323 blogs were counted. The counting of links was done with the help of a free program 'Link Counter' of Submit Express (<http://linkcounter.submitexpress.com/>), a Search Engine Optimization program. This program was used to count the number of links present on each blog. This program displays links as Total Number of links, Internal Links, Out-Going links and No-follows.

Internal Links are defined as, “An internal link is a hyperlink that is a reference or navigation element in a document to another section of the same document or to another document that may be on or part of the same website or domain of the internet”. (Wikipedia, 2013)

Out-Going Links or External Links are defined as, “An external link is a link that points at an external domain” (Moz, 2013) and No-Follows are links which are not followed by the search engines. The anchor text displayed in the screenshot shown below is the visible, clickable text in a hyperlink. This hyperlinking anchor text can be an image or a text.

For example, for the blog *A Library Writer's Blog* (<http://librarywriting.blogspot.in/>) the program ‘Link Counter’ of Submit Express displayed the following result.

In this group the blog with the highest number of links 1902 is *Walt at Random* followed by *Bad Librarianship Now!*, *Library History Buff Blog*, and *UK Web Focus*. The blog with the highest number of internal links is *Walt at Random* and the blog with the highest number of external links is *UK Web Focus*.

A closer analysis of the number of links in a blog shows that the blogs fall within a range of 1-2000 links. This link range was divided into a gap of every 200 links per blog giving ten (10) divisions. Table 5.15 shows the breakup of blogs on the basis of the total number of blogs with links in different ranges across each broad subject category.

Maximum numbers of blogs, 167 blogs have links within the first range which is 1-200 followed by 121 blogs in the second range 201-400. No blogs have links between the ranges 1401-1600. The blog, *Walt at Random* has links within the highest range 1801-2000. The second highest range 1601-1800 has one blog- *Bad Librarianship Now!*

5.3.1 Linking and Popularity of Blogs

PageRank (an algorithm developed by Google co-founder Larry Page), counts hyperlinks as votes for popularity. The pages that have the most links pointing at them are considered the most popular. Although this algorithm has become more complex today, it still includes the concept of counting external links as votes.

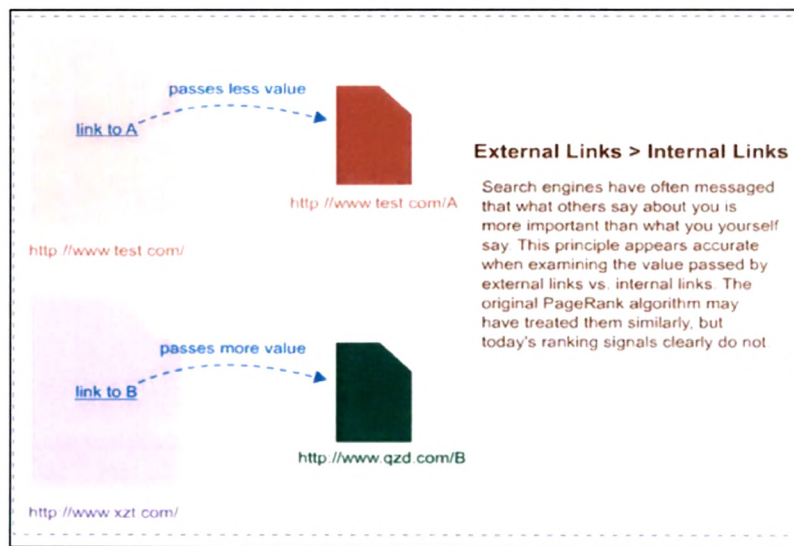

With the above in mind the researcher studied the top ranking blogs with respect to their external and internal links. Out of the eleven broad subject categories, it was found that the top ranking blogs of the six broad subject categories, viz., Ethics, LIS Study & Research, Information Science, Library Management, Emerging Technologies, and Services with the highest number of internal links also had the highest number of external links within that broad subject category.

The top ranking blogs displayed in Table 5.16 from the other five broad subject categories, viz., Collection Development, Knowledge Organization & Processing, Libraries, Preservation and Multi- topical showed the following result.

The highlighted blogs in Table 5.16, *Bad Librarianship Now!*, *Catalogablog*, *Library History Buff Blog*, *fresh + new* and *Walt at Random* have less number of external links. The high number of total links achieved by these blogs is due to the high number of internal links. On the other hand there are bloggers whose blog posts consist of selected external links to related content without adding any other content. Therefore their contribution lies in the selection of links which have been hyperlinked on their own blogs.

It was believed that the total number of links present on a blog may depend on the age of the blog. Table 5.17 shows the top ranking blogs with their corresponding age.

As can be seen from the above table, the oldest blog in this group is *Catalogablog* at 10 years; but it does not fall into the top three blogs that have more than thousand links. This is followed by *User Education Resources for Librarians* at 9 years with 804 links and *Walt at Random* with 1902 links and *Bad Librarianship Now!* at 8 years with 1664 links respectively. These bloggers who author the oldest blogs on the LIS blogosphere are now linking to and using other forms of social media such as Twitter, Facebook, Pinterest, etc. to add to their content.

5.4 Major Interpretations

- The statistics regarding the broad subject categorization of LIS blogs yielded fifty four (54) specific subject categories and eleven (11) broad subject categories. Efforts were made to place each blog into a mutually exclusive category based on the analysis of the 'about' section of each blog and in cases where such an explanation was not available the tags given by the blogger with maximum number of posts were considered to be the core subject area of interest to the blogger.
- It seems the basic interest of bloggers is to discuss the emerging technologies (22%) or discuss the collection development aspects (19%) like review of books, open access, e-books, etc. The broad subject category Libraries has 15% blogs, and Multi-topical has 17% blogs. It is unfortunate that ethical aspect forms only 1% of LIS blogs, which is so vital for a clean and robust librarianship; preservation aspect (2%) which is imperative in the digital context; LIS study & research (3%) which is the basis of growth for a subject; service aspect (8%) which is the basic aim of modern librarianship; library management (8%) which is needed for smooth functioning of a

library, receive unreasonably low attention among bloggers. The study of information science (2%) and knowledge organization & processing (3%), fundamental requirements to the study of library and information science also show less representation on the LIS blogosphere.

- Over a period of time a bloggers specialization in a particular subject either changes or remains the same and the blog becomes a reflection of the changes in the subject area. Each blog thus becomes a testament to the changes the subject has undergone or the change in the blogger's interest, format, and name as archived on the blog. Hence the age of each blog was calculated by going to the archives of the blog or the first post of the blog where the archive was not available. For example, the blog, *The Shifted Librarian* has gone through changes in the nomenclature in its earlier form and as of May 2011 shows tweets as the new medium of social media communication adopted by the blogger.
- It is interesting to note that although only 3% blogs are on LIS study & research but one blogger is blogging on this subject since last 16 years which happens to be the longest survival age of the blogs under study. There is only one more blog from the largest subject category, i.e., 'Emerging technologies' which is 16 years old. There are only 6 blogs that are over 10 years old in this subject category. In other words, 8% blogs in both the subject categories are over 10 years old, although one covers 22 % of the total number of blogs and the other a meagre 3%.

- Bloggers it seems like to go solo. Women are blogging more than men if one goes by the statistics of oldest blogs in LIS blogosphere. Fifty- six percent (56%) of the oldest blogs are being written by women and 44% are written by men.

- Blog content comprises of various types of content on its site – hyperlinks or links being one of them. They indicate the effort the blogger has taken in bringing to the notice of the reader content relevant to the subject in discussion or attempts made to validate what the blogger is trying to say.

- The links counted revealed the presence of a high number of total links which was a combination of internal links and external links. Blogs with high number of external links may also be good sources of focused, up- to-date and relevant information in a specific subject area. The top ten blog with the highest number of links have been listed in Table 5.12. The blog Walt at Random a blog from the subject category Multi-topical ranked highest with 1902 links. In the top ten blogs, four blogs were from the subject category Collection Development, three blogs from Multi-topical, two from Libraries and one blog from the subject Emerging Technologies.

- Links are of three types - internal links, external links and no-follows. Out of the 11 broad subject categories, it was found that the top ranking blogs of the 6 categories, viz., Ethics, LIS Study & Research, Information Science, Library Management, Emerging Technologies, and Services with the highest number of internal links also had the highest number of external links within that broad subject category. Out of the 20 oldest blogs, only two blogs emerged with highest number of links in their subject categories.

- The age of blogs with high number of total links revealed that the number of links present is not proportional to the age of the blog. Although one expects the number of links present on a blog to be dependent on the age of the blog, which it does to a certain extent but interestingly, the longest surviving blogs did not happen to be the blogs with highest number of links. Out of the 20 oldest blogs, only two blogs emerged with highest number of links in their subject categories. It means age is not the single most factor for a blog to have more links. It also means that giving links is more of a recent phenomenon in blogging.

- It is important for high ranking bloggers to encourage users to stay connected and share their blog content. Therefore, bloggers are using and encouraging the use of various Web 2.0 tools like RSS feeds, E-mails and Twitter. Sixteen of the oldest blogs (80%) facilitated subscription to their content through RSS feeds. Eleven blogs (55%) facilitate access to their blog content through E-mail followed by Twitter being used by 10 blogs.

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
