PREFACE

What began as a young student's quest out of curiosity soon turned in to a moral commitment - a professional responsibility; and the present study is an outcome of the same.

I first learnt about the existence of red-light area in Surat while I was browsing through the literature for selecting a topic for my M.S.W. Dissertation in 1979. I had hardly known that Surat, my birth place, had one of the oldest redlight areas of Gujarat. Until then, I was aware about the existence of brothels only at three places - Bombay, Calcutta and the Hindi cinema ! My first exposure to the life of prostitutes in late seventies was shocking and disturbing. It brought me close to the realities of the plight of the victimised women and girls who lived very much intheworld of my own and still so much away from me ! I also learnt about the apathy of the community, local and state administration and above all, the intellectuals and elites towards this socially shunned class.

My first study completed in 1980, but I decided that I shall keep my contacts alive with them and shall try my best to contribute whatever little I could in their struggle for survival and justice. Since then, I seized every opportunity to study and work for them. Over and above brothel based prostitutes of Surat, I also explored the life of street walking prostitutes of Baroda and brothel based prostitutes in Rajkot - sometimes directly and sometimes through my post-graduate students. As a result, I was invited to participate in the state administration's efforts to chalkout rehabilitation plans for them as a member of the Gujarat State Advisory Committee on the problems of child prostitutes and children of prostitutes. I am glad that the state government has now accepted the moral responsibility of supporting their rehabilitation.

Documenting the field realities and updating the same from time to time was the best way I could contribute as a professional social worker active in academics and hence I decided to focus my Ph.D. study also on the same target group.

I owe my sincere gratitude to my research guide Dr. M.D. Vyas for his encouragement, support and insightful guidance right from the stage of conception of research design to the completion of research study. Dr. Vyas and Smt. Rashmi Vyas generously tolerated my frequent unplanned visits for consultation at their residence, even during vacations.

I also wish to place on record my sincere thanks to Prof. Varsha Anjaria, the then Dean and Head, for facilitating our long awaited registration as Ph.D. students. Prof. Navle, our present Dean and Head has ensured fulfilling necessary procedural formalities, for which I acknowledge his support with gratitude.
