Preface

In 2003-2004 while studying A Vedic Reader for Students (by A. A. Macdonell) under Prof. Dr. Jaydev Jani (my guiding teacher), I was surprised to learn the incorporeal form of Vedic deitharpati and many a times I asked Prof. Jani about how incorporeal deity got transformed into a personal and gradually in the shape of a Spiritual Teacher or a Holy Master. Prof. Jani was clear in his explanations and at that time I decided to work further in this field of the literary process of Vedic deity Bṛhaspati attaining the corporeal form.

After completing my Postgraduate studies in Sanskrit I joined the course of B. Lib. (2006-2007) and during that period I had an opportunity to collect all the books of my interest. In that course of time I used to visit Prof. Jani's cabin and discussed about the reference books and other available material. Here I happened to look at Dr.Bali Sarasvati's book titled Baspati in Vedas and Puranas. Her study is restricted to the general survey of the character and the exploits of Brhaspati. This present study however, does not put any stress on Brhaspati's character and exploits only, but it also presents the textual analysis with clear topics like Baspati's character, qualities, valour, physical appearance, association with Indra and other gods as well as the sacrificers and sacrificial rituals and also gradual development. In this direction the references along with their context from the texts like

Brāhmanas, Arankās, Upnisads and Epics as well as 18 Purānās are taken under discussion for the reason that the complete and perfect picture of Bṛhaspati can be drawn.

The present thesis has provided the study under the heads like Bṛhaspati's personality, association with other gods, physical appearance, and valiant as well as benevolent nature.

Moreover the sole purpose of the present thesis is to present the gradual development of Bṛhaspati's personality from the preceptor of the god to the preceptor of the men and finally the Holy Master depicted as the Creator, Protector, Destroyer, Benevolent and the Supreme Reality.

In this connection the epoch-making work Vaidika Devatā by Dr. G. C. Tripathi (Pub.1982), History of Indian Literature by M. Winternitz by A. B. Keith, by H. C. Agarwal, etc. seem to be satisfied by mere descriptive presentation and hence they remain silent in the providing relevant references and quotations.

The present thesis aims at the study of Braspati on the basis of the quotations from the Vedas and the Purānas. Therefore one may find ample differences in the study, presentation, discussion and even in the conclusion.

The present thesis attempts humbly to bring out the missing and even untouched problems unsolved so far. The most important problem of Bṛhaspati's pious and righteous personality is tried to solve on the authority of the Vedic hymns and Puranic mythologies.
