

INTRODUCTION

The idea of establishing a University at Baroda started engaging the attention of the former Government of Baroda State in the year 1909. Some schemes for the establishment of the University were framed but none of them materialised. The Baroda University Commission of 1925 made out a strong case for the establishment of a Unitary Residential University at Baroda having the Faculties of Arts, Science, Technology and Agriculture, Economics, Commerce and Administration. Besides the Faculties, the University was to have the Institute for Oriental Studies, the Institute for Gujarati Studies, the School of Fine Arts, the School of Nursing and the School of Domestic Science. Provision was also to be made for extension programmes, the Library movement as a University extension movement and compulsory medical examination. Although circumstances at that time were not favourable to the establishment of a separate University, the idea was not given up. The following institutions for higher education were established in Baroda during the two decades that followed:

- 1. The Secondary Teachers' Training College in 1935
- 2. The Sayaji Golden Jubilee Science Institute in 1937
- 3. The Pratapsinh College of Commerce and Economics in 1942
- 4. Government orders were passed for the establishment of Medical and Engineering Colleges which ultimately began functioning from 1949.

In 1947, the late His Highness Maharaja Sir Pratapsinh Gaekwad revived the idea of the University and appointed a committee to consider the question of the early establishment of the University. The Committee submitted its report to the Government of Baroda towards the end of the year 1948 and recommended the establishment of a teaching and residential University with powers to affiliate

mofussil colleges. It favoured the tutorial system of instruction. All the existing institutions of higher education including the Central Library, the Oriental Institute and the Kalabhavan were to be taken over by the University. The Committee also recommended that the Government should give a block grant of Rs. 25 lakhs annually to the University for the first five years.

The Government of Baroda in their Order No. (R) 169-39 dated 21st February, 1949, decided to establish a residential University for Baroda and to affiliate to it the Colleges at Visnagar, Petlad and Navsari which were situated in the State of Baroda. Due to the subsequent merger of the Baroda State with the State of Bombay, the jurisdiction of the University was restricted to the area within a radius of ten miles from the University Office. The University started working on 30th April, 1949 with the following institutions:

- (a) Constituent Institutions under the Management of the University:
 - 1. The Baroda Arts and Science College
 - 2. The Pratapsinh College of Commerce and Economics
 - 3. The Secondary Teachers' Training College
 - 4. The Kalabhavan and the Engineering College
 - 5. The Music College
 - 6. The Oriental Institute
- (b) Constituent College managed by the Government of Bombay:
 - 7. The Baroda Medical College
- (c) Constituent recognised Institutions managed by the Government of Bombay:
 - 8. The Baroda Museum and Picture Gallery
 - 9. The Baroda Sanskrit Mahavidyalaya

By June, 1950 the institutions taken over were re-organised into the six Faculties of Arts, Science, Education and Psychology, Medicine, Commerce, Technology and Engineering. The First Year and the Intermediate classes in Arts and Commerce were organised into a separate institution called the Intermediate College. Three new Faculties of Fine Arts, Home Science and Social Work were also started from June, 1950. The management of the Baroda Sanskrit Mahavidyalaya and the Gujarati Section of the Old Baroda High School were taken over by the University from the then Government of Bombay in 1951. To start with, the University followed the Bombay University courses and the standards of admissions, examinations, etc. The first examinations of the

Growth of Student Enrolment

Student Enrolment: When the University first started functioning in April, 1949, it had, as its total strength 2,962 students, of whom 131 were post-graduate

students, 902 degree class students and the remaining reading for the under-graduate diploma or certificate courses. In the next twenty-three years, the total enrolment of students in the University has risen from 2,962 to 17,986 registering a six-fold increase. The average yearly increase in student enrolment since 1949 has been nearly 653.

In 1950, the total number of men students was 3,503. This number increased to 13,404 in 1972-73, registering a rise of over three times. The rise in the enrolment of women students has been more remarkable. Between 1950 and 1972-73 the enrolment of women students in the University increased from 484 to 4,582 which is a rise of nine times over the figure of 1950.

The enrolment trends over the last twenty-three years in the University are indicated in the following table:

Student Enrolment in Post-graduate Courses: The enrolment of students in various post-graduate courses offered in the different Faculties and Institutions of the University has been showing a steady rise from 1950-51. The enrolment in the post-graduate courses which was 304 to start with has gone on increasing, when students between 1950-51 and 1972-73. The number of post-graduate women students by 490.

Growth of Enrolment in Post-graduate Courses: The enrolment of post-graduate women students between 1950-51 and 1972-73 has increased by 929 and that of

Growth of Enrolment in Degree Courses: In 1950-51 there were 2,161 students reading for the first degree in the under-graduate classes of the different faculties and institutions of the University. The figure for 1972-73 is 14,417. Thus, between 1950-51 and 1972-73 the under-graduate student population of the University has increased by six hundred percent. University Teachers

University Teachers and the Staff-student Ratio: The total number of teachers (including Assistant Lecturers and Part-time Lecturers) in the Faculties and Institutions of the University during the year under report is 954 (including 126 teachers of Medical College) as against the total student enrolment of 17,986. This gives an over-all teacher-student ratio of 1:18.85. The staff-student ratio over the last five years is indicated below:

Hostel and Health Services

Halls of Residence: With the rapid increase in student enrolment, the pressure of demand from students for residential accommodation in the University Halls of Residence has been on the increase. The University has been taking all possible steps to increase the hostel facilities for the students. At its start in 1949, the University had accommodation for 400 men students and no accommodation for women students. At the end of the year under review there were 11 halls for men and 4 for women students. There were 2368 men students and 844 women students in the different halls. The percentage of students residing in the University hostels work out at 17.8. The corresponding figures for the five years are as under:

In the twenty-four years of its existence, the faculties and institutions of the University have made considerable progress. The courses have been revised from time to time and emphasis continues to be laid on seminars and home assignments consistent with the special requirements of a teaching University. Efforts are also benig made to improve conditions, academic and physical, obtaining in the Faculties and Institutions. Provision of adequeate staff, improvement of old buildings, addition of new buildings, creation of a suitable academic climate, development of library and laboratory facilities, increasing the research output, and the maintenance of student discipline—all these continued to receive close attention.

The new Faculties of Fine Arts, Home Science and Social Work were established in the year 1950 and the Faculty of Law in 1961. In 1965 a new College—Shri Manibhai Kashibhai Amin Arts and Science College and College of Commerce was started at Padra.

With financial assistance from the University Grants Commission, the University was able to strengthen and consolidate the teaching and research activities in various departments of humanities, social sciences and sciences. The University introduced in 1957 the three year degree courses in Arts, Science and Commerce and post-graduate courses in bio-chemistry, microbiology, geology and home science between 1955 to 1965. The Departments of Archaeology and Ancient History and Museology were also developed with the help of the grants received from the University Grants Commission. In 1964, the Department of Education was upgraded to the status of a Centre of Advanced Study in Education (CASE) to carry on research on problems of education on an All India basis. For several years the University had a Students' Counselling Centre and the Examination Reform and Research Unit between 1959 to 1968. Buildings for teaching and residential accommodation for students and teachers were also constructed with the help of substantial grants from the University Grants Commission in the Second and Third Plan Periods.

Under an expansion scheme in the Second and Third Plan periods, the Faculty of Technology and Engineering increased the yearly intake of students from 75 to 300 in degree courses in Civil, Mechanical and Electrical Engineering. Two new Departments viz. Chemical Engineering and Metallurgical Engineering were established in 1963 and 1966 respectively. The Sandwich pattern has been also introduced for limited number of students in Chemical, Electrical, Mechanical and Metallurgical Engineering degree courses. It has also started 10 post-graduate courses in the different branches of applied mechanics and civil, mechanical, electrical and textile engineering, for which grants are being provided by the University Grants Commission. A Polytechnic

to conduct diploma courses in civil, mechanical and electrical engineering was established in the year 1957. Two schemes approved by the All India Council for Technical Education and the University Grants Commission enabled the University to raise the intake capacity of students in diploma classes at the Polytechnic from 180 to 360. The State (Extended) Diploma courses in civil, mechanical and electrical engineering with an intake capacity of 100 students were started in the Polytechnic in the year 1963. Model Diploma Courses in Petrochemical Technology were started from 16th November, 1970 under the INDO-USSR Credit Agreement of December 1966. During the year 1972-73, a new Department of Continuing/Adult Education Department has been established and the Department of Bio-chemistry has been selected by the University Grants Commission under the Programme of Special Assistance to Seletced Departments.

The development activities during the preceding years are described in the twenty-three Annual Reports that have been published so far. This, the twenty-fourth Annual Report covers the period from 1st April, 1972 to 31st March, 1973 and is submitted to the Senate in accordance with Section 24(2) of the Maharaja Sayajirao University of Baroda Act as amended up-to-date.

2. Number of Students

The number of University students during the year was 17,986 (13.404 men students and 4 582 women students) and that of non-University students was 1.861 (1.201 men students and 660 women students). The details of the students are given in Appendices I and II.

3. Special Features of the year

- (1) Convocations:
- (i) The Twenty Second Annual Convocation was held on 2nd December. 1972. Shri Fatehsinhrao P. Gaekwad, Chancellor presided over the Convocation. Shri H. M. Patel, I.C.S. (Retd.), M.P. delivered the Convocation Address, 2,766 Degrees and Diplomas were conferred.
- (ii) The Thirteenth Supplementary Convocation was held on 25th March, 1973. The Vice-Chancellor presided over the Convocation. 400 Degrees and Diplomas were conferred. Details about the award of degrees and diplomas at the above Convocations are given in Appendix III.
- (2) New Develompents:
- (i) The Department of Continuing/Adult Education was started in August 1972.
- (ii) On the recommendation of the Visiting Committee, the University Grants Commission sanctioned the posts of 4 Readers, 3 Lecturers and 2 Research Assistants and a non-recurring grant of Rs. 18,000

for the development of the Teacher Education and Research in the Faculty of Education and Psychology. The State Government's consent for taking over the recurring liability of the above posts from April, 1979 is awaited.

- (iii) On the recommendation of the Visiting Committee, the University Grants Commission sanctioned a non-recurring grant of Rs. 17,74,000/- and a recurring grant of Rs. 3,00,000 for the establishment of the Centre for degree course in Pharmacy in the Faculty of Technology and Engineering. The Government of Gujarat has agreed to provide the matching share (50%) and also to take over the recurring liability on completion of the 5 year period of the U.G.C. grant.
- (iv) The University Grants Commission sanctioned a grant of Rs. 2,00,000/- for purchase of books and journals on Humanities and Science subjects.

(6) Other Important Events:

- (i) The University started the construction of a new building to provide separate library facilities for under-graduate students, to ease the congestion experienced in Smt. Hansa Mehta Library. The building, including furniture, is estimated to cost Rs. 14.07 lakhs. Sir Sayajirao Diamond Jubilee and Memorial Trust and the University Grants Commission agreed to provide grants of Rs. 6/- lakhs and Rs. 7/- lakhs respectively and the State Government agreed to provide Rs. 1/- lakh for this project. The Corner stone for this building was on 21st June, 1972.
- (ii) Under the Tagore Chair Programme Professor James O. Barnhill Head, Department of English Drama, Brown University, Providence, U.S.A. was invited for a period of three months during the year. With the help of the Shakespeare Society in the Faculty of Arts, Professor Barnhill produced two delivered lectures on Dramatics and conducted a staff seminar on Drama and workshops on Acting and Theatre practices.

Under this programme, Professor Ben Norris, leading painter and distinguished teacher of Arts, University of Hawaii was also invited for three weeks to deliver 12 lectures/studio demonstrations in the Faculty of Fine Arts.

- (iii) On 11th November, 1972, the University organised a Seminar on Historiography which was inaugurated by Professor Nurul Hassan, Minister for Education and Social Welfare, Government of India.
- (iv) Dr. Y. Nayadumma, Director General, Council of Scientific and Industrial Research, New Delhi, delivered two lectures on 'Problems and Prospects for Technology Utilization' on 16th and 17th February, 1973, under the Maharaja Sayajirao Memorial Lectures during the year.
- (v) In response to the appeals of the Pro-Vice-Chancellor, a number of teachers participated in Scarcity Relief Projects in Gujarat during the summer vacation. The staff and students of the University collected Rs. 10,225 for the Drought Relief Fund.

4. Teaching Staff

The total number of teaching staff (excluding 126 in Medical College) consisted of 59 Professors, 119 Readers, 472 Lecturers, 137 Assistant Lecturers and Instructors, 41 Honorary, Part-time and others, the total being 828. (Appendix IV)

CHAPTER IV—OTHER AUTHORITIES OF THE UNIVERSITY

1. Council of Post-graduate Studies and Research

The Council of Post-graduate Studies and Research met four times during the year on 31st July, 17th November, 18th December, 1972 and 26th February, 1973. The following are the main items considered and recommended by the Council and approved subsequently by the Syndicate:

- (4) 42nd and 43rd half-yearly Progress Reports of the Critical Editions of Old Gujarati Texts (Prachin Gurjar Granthmala);
- (5) The National Dairy Research Institute, Karnal (Haryana) be recognised as a Centre for purposes of carrying on research work for the Ph.D. degree in Microbiology under the Faculty of Science for the benefit of eligible students of this University or persons deputed by this University;
- (6) Approved the addition of the following provision in the existing O. Ph.D. 13:
 - "Notwithstanding the provision contained in para (b) above the Council of Post-graduate Studies and Research may recommend to the Syndicate in special cases to permit the candidates to submit their Ph.D. thesis late by granting necessary extension, subject to the condition that they shall have to pay the necessary tuition fees for each additional term or a part thereof."
- (7) Approved the addition of the following provision in the existing O Ph.D. 9:
 - "Each candidate shall be required to submit to the University Office 3 copies of the summary of his thesis, consisting of not more than 1000 words at the time of the actual submission of his thesis. After the thesis is accepted for the award of the Ph.D. degree, this summary will be forwarded to the Editor for being published in the University Journal."

It is also decided that the above provision be added as O. Ph.D. (H.S.) 10 A in the existing Ph.D. Ordinances meant for the Faculty of Home Science.

- (v) Recommended that the new special field "Population Education" be introduced as an optional subject at the B.Ed. level.

- (i) Recommended that the draft rules and detailed syllabus for instituting the Post-graduate Diploma in Public Health (D.P.H.) course in the Faculty of Medicine be approved.

(6) Faculty of Technology and Engineering:

- (i) Recommended that the proposed scheme of teaching on the basis of Semester System for Textile Engineering and Textile Technology Degree Courses be approved and be introduced progressively from June, 1973.
- (ii) Recommended that the proposal to start Co-operative Courses in Civil Engineering Department of 11 Semesters (5½ years' duration) be approved and candidates will be awarded B.Tech. (Civil) degree, after successful completion of 11 Semesters.
- (iii) Recommended that the scheme of teaching and examination for one year Post-graduate Diploma course in Petrochemical Technology be approved.
- (iv) Recommended that the proposal to award B.Tech. Degree in Civil, Mechanical branches for those successfully completing the Co-operative Course of 5½ years' duration be approved.
- (v) Recommended that the proposal of Introduction of the Supplementary courses in Mechanical and Electrical Engineering for the benefit of the students who have passed Extended Diploma courses in Electrical Engineering/Mechanical Engineering and amending relevant Ordinances be approved. Such a benefit be also given to students who have passed Diploma in Mechanical/Electrical Engineering of three year duration (i.e. Regular batch) in order to qualify for the supplementary Extended Diploma in Electrical/Mechanical branches.

(7) Fine Arts:

- (i) Recommended that the title of the existing course in Western Aesthetics be renamed as "Introduction to Western Aesthetics".
- (ii) Recommended that separate lectures for the subject of History of Art be arranged for the benefit of diploma holders.
- (iii) Recommended that internal tests be conducted for the assessment of the work done by the diploma students.
- (iv) Recommended that the details of the syllabi, admission requirements etc. for the M.A. (Fine) Art History course be approved as recommended by the Sub-committee.
- (v) Recommended that the proposed modified rules relating to standard of passing, award of classes and exemption for the Degree, Post-Music, Dance and Dramatics be modified and approved.

- (vi) Recommended that the existing rule No. 6 printed in Music College prospectus of 1972-73 be modified and approved as under: "If a student fails in any of the practicals of the specialization subject, he will have to rejoin the college as a regular student and study the subject. He will not be eligible to appear in the practical examination as an ex-student".
- (vii) Recommended that the following recommendation of the Sub-committee be accepted and the same be implemented on the basis of the present syllabus and necessary instruction for the Museology course be given from June to June without observing vacations, provided adequate teaching help is provided for:

 "Students with a Master's degree in Science or Humanities will be able to complete their training in 12 months, July to June (foregoing vacations and working continuously)."
- (viii) Recommended that the in-servicemen, coming for training (for Diploma in Museology) from museums will be given the same facility to complete their training in 12 months as students with a Master's degree.
- (ix) Recommended that the Department of Museology can enlarge its activities by introducing short-term certificate courses in (a) Museum Education Service, (b) Exhibition Techniques and (c) Taxidermy each of three months' duration. It also modified and approved details of syllabi, admis ion requirements etc. for the above certificate courses and recommended that the same be implemented provided adequate teaching help is given.



CHAPTER V-BOARDS AND COMMITTEES

General

A summary of business transacted by various Boards and Committees, during the year, is given below:

1. University Board of Sports:

Two meetings of the Boards of Sports were held during the year. The Board appointed (i) a Committee to select teams to represent the University tournament, (ii) a Committee to organise and conduct the South Zone Inter-University Basket Ball Tournament for women, (iii) the Officer-in-Charge, Badminton and Table Tennis. The Board recommended (i) to honour Shri S. B. Parab and Kumari Achala Deore (Kho-Kho) and Shri Sankpal (Cricket) at the time of Annual Prize Distribution, for getting the Arjun Award, (ii) to frame rules and regulations for Weight Training Club, (iii) to give colours to the teams participating in matches with out-side teams in Baroda or in Gujarat, (iv) to provide facilities of Badminton (Open Court), Basket Ball and Volley-ball to the Institutions on avaiability of the ground etc. in consultation with the Heads of Institutions, (v) to establish the School of Physical Education after finalisation of the scheme and its approval by the Board, (vi) to institute the "Ranjit-award" for the best cricketer of the year.

2. Publication Board:

The Committee met twice during the year on 9th August, 1972 and 19th December, 1972. It considered and recommended for publication the works (i) 'A Comparative study of English and Gujarati Syntaxes' by Dr. J. J. Mody. (ii) 'Kandala, the North Western Gate-way of India' Research Paper VI of the Department of Geography, (iii) A Catalogue of theses accepted by University (iv) "Capital—Output Relations in Indian Manufacturing during 1946-64" by Dr. S. R. Hasim and Dr. M. M. Dadi as Vol. No. 2 of "The Maharaja Sayajirao University Economic Series".

3. Library Committee

The Committee met on 27th June, 1972. It approved the subscription of Journals for renewal and the report of the satisfactory service rendered by the appointed vendors. The Committee in their report dated 13-3-1973 (arrived at by circulation) approved the allocation of the book grant of Rs. 2,00,000/sanctioned by the University Grants Commission.

4. University Building and Planning Committee

The Committee met on 18th December, 1972. It appointed a Sub-committee which met on 9th January, 1973 and recommended various works of

Ordinary and Special Repairs amounting to Rs. 3,25,000 and purchase of cupboards in the halls, providing street lights at the Padra College, Works in the Faculties of Technology and Engineering and Fine Arts, water purification plant for Swimming Pool, Canteen and Common Room in Arts Faculty Campus, etc. amounting to Rs. 4,75,000 approximately. The Sub-committee also recommended construction of water Tank over the Maharshi Vishvasaraiya Hall at a cost of Rs. 20,000/- and conversion of 3" water main to 4" water main (pipelines) from Adhyapak Kutir to the Swimming Pool and to the Faculty of Home Science at a cost of Rs. 28,000/-.

5. Standing Committee on Equivalence of Examinations:

The committee met twice during the year 1972-73 on 31st July, 1972 and 26th February, 1973. It considered a number of items regarding equivalence of various examinations and special cases of eligibility of students.

Important recommendations are as under:

6. Academic Committee

The Committe did not meet during the academic year 1972-73.

7. Preparatory Courses Committee

The General Education and the Preparatory Courses Committee met on 12th April, 1972. The committee recommended the following:

- (i) The present practice of reserving 20% seats in the First Year Diploma in Polytechnic for students passing S.S.C. with English and with Technical subjects be continued.
- (ii) 50% of the seats be reserved for admission to Preparatory Commerce for students passing S.S.C. with English and with both the Commerce subjects viz. Elements of Commerce and Book-keeping in addition to those get admitted in normal course on merit.
- (iii) the existing syllabi etc. for English i.e. for Paper I, Paper V and Paper II (Additional English) be modified and approved as recommended by the Preparatory Sub-committee in English;
- the revised syllabus in Mathematics for Preparatory Arts and Preparatory Commerce courses be approved as recommended by the Preparatory Courses Sub-Committee for Paper V-Mathematics for Preparatory Arts, Commerce and Science;
- recommended a Committee to consider the re-organisation of courses at the Preparatory Stage vis-a-vis the integration of the General Education courses at the degree stages. It further recommended that till such time as the matter is finalized and implemented, the General Education Department may continue to arrange programmes of General Education on a different pattern making them more attractive, utilitarian and beneficial as discussed at the Sub-Committee meeting.

8. Deans' Meeting

Three meetings of the committee of the Deans of Faculties and Heads of Institutions were held during the year. The Committee recommended the following:

- (i) steps be taken to see that some senior and experienced teachers are made available for some of the teaching work in lower classes;
- (ii) starting of tutorial classes for the weak students;
- (iii) provision be made for appointment of Review Committees for each and every Departments of the University for the review of work already done by them and for periodical review once in 3 years;
- (iv) to make a suitable change in Terms and Vacations;
- (v) to make programmes for the staff and students for the scarcity affected areas in Gujarat State, especially in Baroda and Panchmahal Districts:
- (vi) the present system of wearing gowns and hoods at the University Convocations be replaced by Scarves of different colours.

9. Finance and Establishment Standing Committee

Twelve meetings of the committee were held during the year. The Committee considered several items concerning requests for additional establishment grants, purchase of equipments, approval of plans, estimates and tenders for construction work, contracts for supply of petrol, services of vehicles, cleaning and adjustment of typewriters and requests from staff members regarding study leave etc. The recommendations of the committee were placed before the Syndicate.

The Committee met as the Budget Committee on 25th January, 1973. It submitted to the Syndicate, the revised estimates for the year 1972-73 and the estimates for the year 1973-74 after scrutinising various proposals received from Faculties, Institutions and offices of the University.

10 Investment Committee

The Committee held nine meetings during the year. The recommendaations of the Committee in the matter of investment of the University funds were approved by the Syndicate.

11. Press Supervisory Committee

Eight meetings of the committee were held during the year. They considered monthly reports of the Press Manager regarding the work of the Press, the Stationery Unit and Publication Sales Unit and also Printing Programme and made recommendations regarding purchase of paper, stationery, equipment etc.

12. Sir Sayajirao III Memorial Research Prize Fund Committee

The Committee met on 2nd March, 1973 for scrutinizing the essays on " ભારતીય રાજકારણમાં વિરાધ પક્ષ-સમસ્યાઓ અને ભાવિ" for the year 1971-72. The prize was awarded to Shri Anand Mavlankar for writing the best essay for the year

It was decided to invite essays on the subject " ગુજરાતમાં પારસીઓનું આગમન અને तेमना गुજरातनी संस्कृतिमां झणा " for the year 1972-73.

13. Advisory Committee for the University Health Centre

One meeting of the Committee was held during the year.

14. Wardens' Committee

Three meetings of the Committee were held during the year.

15. Advisory Committee for N.S.S.

The Committee met on 29th August, 1972. It recommended (i) to authorise the Vice-Chancellor to purchase a vehicle for Ruro-Tribal Project to be taken under the N.S.S. Programme, (ii) to reorganise the administrative setup of the present establishment within Rs. 20/-per student per year for running

the N.S.S. activities smoothly, (iii) to appoint a programme Committee consisting of Hon. Director, N.S.S. as Chairman and the Representatives of various departments of the Government, Municipal Corporation and Social Organisations etc.

16. Selection Committees

There were 18 meetings of the Selection Committee, appointed under Section 48 (2) of the Act and they recommended 19 candidates for appointment to the posts of Professors and Readers in various Faculties and Institutions in the University. There were 35 meetings of the Standing Selection Committee for Junior posts and 24 meetings of the Standing Selection Committee for Class III posts and 54 and 41 candidates respectively were recommended by these Committees, for appointment to different posts in the University.

17. M. S. University Students' Aid Fund Committee

The Committee met twice during the year on 6th October, 1972 and on 13th February, 1973. The total amount of help given to students by way of tuition fees, examination fees, books, educational materials, loans etc. during the year 1972-73 was Rs. 34,947-00.

18. The Central Advisory Committee

The Committee held two meetings on 30th September, 1972 and 5th October, 1972 under the Chairmanship of Prof. K. N. Naik, Dean, Faculty of Commerce. Some of the recommendations of the Committee are as under:

- (i) The M. S. University Union be given more grants by the University.
- (ii) Part-time Degree Courses in Engineering be started for the benefit of Diploma holders.
- (iii) Morning Classes for Preparatory Commerce students be held in the second term of the year 1972-73.
- (iv) More staff be given at the Library of Shri M. K. Amin Arts and Science College and College of Commerce, Padra.
- (v) The issue of giving two book passes instead of one at the University Library be referred to the University Library Committee.
- (vi) All academic issues concerning the Medical College and the holding of additional Pre-Medical examination in October be referred to the relevant Boards of Studies and the Faculties.
- (vii) The President, M. S. University Union, be given the suitable status and also administrative allowance of Rs. 100/- p.m. and other benefits.

- (viii) The General Secretary, the Vice-President and the President, M. S. University Union be invited to attend the Senate meetings in future.
- (ix) Students staying in Halls of Residence be provided with facilities such as Tubelights, hot water in winter, a cup board, adequate plumbing and sanitary arrangement, etc.

19. Board of Visitors:

A meeting of the Board of Visitors for the Faculty of Fine Arts was held on 28th March, 1972. The Board recommended that—(a) Under-graduate course in Ceramic Design be implemented after it is drawn up and considered by the Board of Studies, (b) Under-graduate courses in Art teaching within the frame work of the present under-graduate courses of the Faculty be drawn and considered by the Board of Studies. The course may be implemented between the Faculty of Fine Arts and Faculty of Education and Psychology without any substantial financial implications and that the Department of Education, Gujarat State be approached for its recognition before its implementation; (c) a post of an Archivist in the scale applicable to Assistant Lecturer i.e. Rs. 300-25-600 (plus D.A. as per teaching posts) be created in the Art History

20. Board of Extra-Mural Studies:

The Board recommended a programme of extension lectures by University teachers and outside experts. An amount of Rs. 10,500/- was sanctioned for the purpose.

CHAPTER VI—RESEARCH WORK IN THE UNIVERSITY



Botany, Chemistry, Economics (at subsidiary level only), Geography, Geology, Mathematics, Physics, Statistics and Zoology.

The M.Sc. course is of two years' duration after B.Sc. It is taught in wo parts viz. M.Sc. (Previous) and M.Sc. (Final). The course is by papers in all the subjects except Microbiology where a dissertation is a requirement.

The Ph.D. course is by research only and minimum period of its duration is two years after M.Sc.

6. Centre of Advanced Study in Education

This Centre continued to encourage the pursuit of 'excellence' and 'tear work' in studies and research in Education, and accelerate the realisation high standards in these fields through its multifacet activities during the year 1972-73.

Research Activities:

Research programmes going on at the Centre have the following special characteristics: (i) studies undertaken at the Centre are aimed at providing break through in certain selected areas, (ii) studies are mostly experimental in nature involving sophisticated designs, (iii) team work is emphasized and persons with different specialisation work on the project, (iv) findings of studies carried out at the Centre are communicated to the teacher-educators and training institutions through publications and extension lectures, and (v) assistance is provided to educational institutions in the implementation and execution of research findings.

The areas of research on which work is going on at present are the following:

- (i) Teacher Education, Teacher Behaviour, Teaching;
- (ii) Innovations and Educational Change Process; and
- (iii) Educational Technology and Programmed Instructions.

Exploratory rese rch has also been initiated in creativity, achievement motivation, psychometry institutional climate and teacher morale.

Research programmes in Teacher Behaviour, Instructional Technology and Educational Change Process, have their specific rationale and priorities. The Centre visualises that intensive and sustained research in the first two areas might lead to the development of a 'Theory of teaching' which would help in improving programmes of Teacher Education and actual teaching in school classrooms.







5. Shri Sayaji General Hospital

The Hospital is a teaching institution attached to the Medical College for Under-graduates and Post-graduates of the M. S. University of Baroda. It has a total staff of 1205 employees.

The Hospital has at present 924 beds and provides facilities of all types of cases. viz. General Medical, Surgery, Paediatrics, Ophthalmic, Plastic, Obstetrics and Gynaec., Orthopaedic, Psychiatric, Dental, E.N.T., C.T., Skin and V.D., Physiotherapy. Moreover special clinics viz. Neurology, Well Baby Clinic, Fertility, Sterility, Diabetic, Neuro-Medical, Respiratory, Antinatal, Family Planning, Anti-rabic, etc. are running at this hospital.

It has X-Ray Department, Central Sterile Supply Department, Pharmacy Department, Blood Bank, Laboratories, Orthopaedic Workshop and School of Physiotherapy.

The Hospital treated 1,90,748 patients in Out-door Patient Department (i.e. 1079.94 daily) and 32,294 patients in Indoor Patient Department (i.e. 261.77 daily) and performed 25,256 operations during the year under report. The X-Ray Department took 39,476 X-Ray plates and the Anti-Rabic Clinic gave treatment to 3014 dog-bite cases.

CHAPTER XII (B)—SHETH UJAMSHI PİTAMBERDAS AYURVEDIC RESEARCH UNIT

1. Functions of the Unit

Research in Ayurveda is the sole object of this Unit. The Unit has a Library, a Museum of Indian Medical Herbs and Minerals, a Clinical Laboratory, a Rash-shala.

2. Library

The total number of books is 2,631.

3. Museum

Fifty groups of available medicinal herbs, each group consisting of 10 drugs according to the pharmacological classification of Charak are arranged and maintained in the Museum. Specimens of minerals and other useful medicines have also been kept. A section of Ayurvedic Pharmacological medicines is also maintained. There are about 1,000 Ayurvedic specimens, 54 herbarium flames, 7, Originals of Ayurved Photo frames 75 specimen jars of fresh herbs preserved in solution, 16 charts and maps. About 300 specimens have been collected for the herbarium and are classified. A relief map of India showing the distribution of important medicinal plants in India is exhibited in the Museum.

4. Garden

Sixty Ayurvedic herbs are maintained in the garden for fresh juices and quathas that are used in Pharmacy preparations and clinical trials.

5. Reorganisation of the Unit

The Unit has been reorganized during the year as per the following details:

- (i) The research work will be conducted on Ayurvedic Clinical Lines.
- (ii) Principal, Government Shuddha Ayurvedic College, Baroda will be the Project Officer of this Unit.
- (iii) A Research Officer and an Assistant Research Officer will be appointed on long terms basis.
- (iv) A separate O.P.D. will be started for the Unit as in the past.
- (v) Twenty beds with Male and Female allotment will be provided at the S.S.G. Hospital, Baroda as at present. Nursing personnel as well as Ward servants, Sweeper etc. would be manned and managed by the Hospital.

- (vi) House Physicians will be appointed for short tenures of one year and on fixed salary.
- (vii) The Project Officer will be a Member of the Staff Selection Committee of the Unit.
- (viii) The administration of the Unit will be controlled by the University as at present.
- (ix) Modern investigations will continue to be conducted by the respective departments of the Medical College and Hospital.
- (x) The new set-up of establishment for research programme to be started at the Unit and the scales of pay/honorarium for the new posts with D.A. rates will be as per Sarela Commission scales where ver applicable. The posts of the Pharmacist, the Case-Writer and the Sweeper be not provided for at present and the present confirmed employees of the Unit in Class III and Class IV including the Research Assistant in Chemistry be suitably absorbed in the new set-up.
- (xi) The entire responsibility of the medical care and treatment of the in-door patients kept at the S.S.G. Hospital Baroda under the research programme of the Unit will be that of the Project Offic. 11.

6. Method of clinical research work

(A) Selection of patients:

Normally the patients will be admitted for research purpose from the General Ayurvedic O.P.D. Suspected cases for the scheme will be admitted to the Indoor Patient Department of the hospital.

(B) Methods of the investigation:

After admitting the patients in the Indoor Department they will be examined according to Ayurvedic Method of "Nidan Panchak" and "Rogi Pariksha" and the diagnosis will be established in each patient. In order to support the Ayurvedic Method of diagnosis necessary modern investigations will also be carried out. The following methods of clinical investigations would be adopted:

- (i) "Rogi Pariksha Vidhi"
- (a) "Prashna Pariksha"

(Interrogation of the Patient)

(b) "Pratyaksha Pariksha" (Clinical examination of the patients and pathological examination of urine, stool and blood etc.

- (ii) Roga Pariksha Vidhi
 - (a) "Nidanani"

(Causes of the diseases)

Duration of trial:

The minimum and the maximum time of the trial will decided by the Project Officer according to diseases.

Observations:

The observations will be recorded in suitable Fabular forms.

CHAPTER XVI—FACULTY OF SOCIAL WORK

1. Review of Progress of Reforms Introduced in the Faculty

The Faculty staff and representatives from senior students and Alumni Association jointly worked for the Admission Program for new entrants during the month of June, 1972.

2. New Experiments-Study-Cum-Service Projects

- (a) On request of the Director, Social Defence, Government of Gujarat, the Faculty organized Orientation Workshop for Officers in Correctional Administration from 22-10-1972 to 3-11-1972.
- (b) Under the joint auspices of the Faculty of Social Work and its Alumni Association, a one-day seminar on 'Social Work and Social Change' was arranged on 3-12-1972, with a view to providing a common platform for practising professional social workers to persive social change factor in proper perceptive.
- the 'Mental Health Week' in the last week of January 1973. During the period, a seminar on "Multi Disciplinary Approach in Mental Health" was arranged. Experts and persons of eminence in the field participated in the Seminar.
- (d) With the help of Government of Gujarat, the Faculty started Trade Union Leadership Programme for Unions' Leaders, office-bearers and workers of registered trade unions in the Gujarat State for a period of 3 months from 15-1-1973.
- (e) On a request from the Central Social Welfare Board, New Delhi, the Faculty has undertaken the work of preparing a Directory of Social Welfare Agencies in the State of Gujarat since December, 1972.
- (f) A Workshop on Family Planning was arranged in the Faculty in the last week of March, 1973, for senior students. This was organized in view of the recommendation made by the Association of Schools of Social Work in India and co-sponsored by the International Association of Schools of Social Work. The Director, Health and Family Planning, Government of Gujarat, Demographic Research Centre, M. S. University and other organizations assisted in conducting the workshop.

3. Courses of Studies

The Faculty offers a two year Post-graduate degree course (M.S.W.) for a career in Social Work.

(1) Class Room Work:

The Courses of study aim at preparing competent practitioners for professional jobs in the field of Social Welfare, Family and Child Welfare, Hospitals for Medical and Psychiatric Services, Rural and Urban Community Welfare, Institutions for Women and Children in the State Department of Social Defence and Industrial Relations and Personnel Management etc.

(2) Field Work (Practical Training):

There are forty-two agencies in and around Baroda City which share in partnership the training programme of the Faculty. The staff and students organised seminars, staff-meetings, discussions and such other activities to further promote the work of the service agency and to equip themselves with up-to-date information on and insight into the problems of the field.

The Faculty continued its community welfare activities at the rural as well urban community centres. A special project on Prevention of Beggary was undertaken in collaboration with NSS volunteers and Agency.

The Faculty continued to get co-operation from agencies in industrial settings. The students carried out useful projects like "Supervisory Practices in Selected Industries" and "A Study of Managements' attitude towards Trade Union". The Faculty is also associated with Workers' Education Centre, Baroda Region. In Medical and Psychiatric setting the Faculty developed school social work services and celebrated "Mental Health Week". These programmes involved a good number of Welfare Agencies and provided a platform for co-operative functioning.





CHAPTER XVIII—ORIENTAL INSTITUTE

1. The main work of the Institute is research and publication of important unpublished works on all subjects related to Indology. In the year 1949 when the Institution was taken over by the University, it had a good record of publications-109 volumes in the Gaekwad Oriental Series and 516 other books. The number of publications at the end of March, 1973 stood at 156 in the Gaekwad Oriental Series and 603 other books. The institute is also in charge of the scheme of preparing text-books in regional languages.

2. Post-graduate Teaching

As a part of the scheme of co-ordination of the teaching of 14 Shastras of Sanskrit in the University 5 members of the Institute are recognised as Post-graduate teachers in Sanskrit and Gujarati for guiding M.A. and Ph.D. Students.

During the year, the Director, the Deputy Director and the Head of the Ramayana Department and other recognised teachers of the staff of the Institute guided 1 Ph.D. student and 49 M. A. students (Part I-II) (Principal and Subordinate). The teaching of Prakrit as a subordinate subject at B. A. and M. A. level was introduced before nine years by the University and Shri J. P. Thaker of this Institute has been teaching Prakrit at the Post-Graduate level since then. During the year of this report he taught the subject to two students (M. A. Part I). The Director also worked as Professor and Head of the Gujarati Department of the Faculty of Arts.

CHAPTER XXV-DEPARTMENT OF CONTINUING/ADULT EDUCATION

1. Programmes and Activities

The Head and other staff members of the department devoted considerable time in initiating processes and activities which are vital to the existence of a new Department during its initial phases of growth and development. 5. Reference Section

Reference Service has been playing an important role in the academic life of the University. The Reference Section conducted a number of activities such as answering queries of readers personally, by correspondence and on phone providing guidance to students and teachers for the better use of the library's resources.

(2) Orientation Programme:

In the beginning of the academic session the Reference Section conducted an orientation programme with a view to acquaint with and familiarize the new entrants to the working of the various sections of the library. Various practices and procedures followed by the library, arrangement of books in the shelves and other technical daries other technical devices were explained to them so that they would be able to make the best use of the library and help themselves in finding out their requisite materials.

(3) Exhibitions:

CHAPTER XXVII—THE MAHARAJA SAYAJIRAO UNIVERSITY OF BARODA PRESS

1. Staff

During the year, the Staff of the Press consisted of Manager, Deputy Manager, Head Clerk (Accounts and Stores), Head Proof-Reader, Senior Proof-Reader, Junior Proof-Reader and Clerk. There are 40 permanent workers in the Press.

2. Machinery

The Press has machinery worth Rs. 3,21,099 including machines worth Rs. 1,19,350 purchased from the grant of the University Grants Commission and the State Government. A Gestafex Scanning Machine was purchased this year at the cost of Rs. 23,022/-.

3. Printing Activities

During the year 1,302 plus 284 examination papers were printed under conditions of secrecy for University Examinations. The Press also printed Syndicate and Senate proceedings, Details of Establishment, Magazines, Annual Accounts, Budget Estimates, Questionnaires, Pamphlets, Certificates, General forms, Prospectus, Souvenirs etc. of the Faculties and Institutions. The University Press has been working purely as a service department of the University from April, 1967.

It has a staff of Senior Clerk, Stationery Clerk, Riksha Driver-cum-Stationery Distributor and Helper. During the year Stationery worth Rs. 1,97,140 was purchased and Stationery worth Rs. 2,30,148 was distributed.

5. University Publication Sales Unit

This Unit is under the control and supervision of the University Press Manager. The establishment consists of Senior Clerk, Clerk and Outdoor work Assistant/Attendant. It is working as the book-shop for University publications. The total sales during the year was Rs. 61,594.

CHAPTER XXVIII—THE MAHARAJA SAYAJIRAO UNIVERSITY UNION

1. Executive Committee

During December 1972, a team of 16 students visited Bhopal University. Bhopal under the Visiting Studentship Scheme sponsored by the University Grants Commission.

CHAPTER XXIX—GENERAL EDUCATION CENTRE

During the formative years of the University considerable thinking was done on the place of General Education in the academic programme of the University. It was felt that while making provision for specialized studies, a University should also ensure that every student, no matter what his speciality, has some understanding of the physical world in which he lives, has an appreciation of the complex social relationships by which he is surrounded and has a grasp of human values which can be developed through contact with Art, Literature of the Humanities. In other words, it was necessary to find a place for the elements of liberal education alongside highly specialized studies.

To this end, the University accepted the principle that General Education should be an important complement to specialisation, and from 1953 a programme of General Education lectures and discussions was arranged for the students of the Arts, Science and Commerce degree classes. From June, 1957 this was extended to the Preparatory classes and the First and Second Year Degree classes in Arts, Science, Commerce, Fine Arts and Home Science as well as the Pre-Medical year and the First Year of the Engineering. Till 1969-70 General Education was a required subject for students of the University but since then it has been made optional.

2. Organisation

The Advisory Committee which consists of the Vice-Chancellor, Pro-Vice-Chancellor, Deans and other Heads, meets at least twice a year and considers recommendations of the General Education Sub-committee on Humanities, Social Sciences and Natural Sciences. The Sub-committee meet as often as necessary and consider problems of revising the syllabi in their own field and recommend reading material and teaching arrangements for the General Education courses in various Faculties.

3. Building and Equipment

Classes met in the General Education Centre. The Centre constructed quipped with the Ford Foundation and equipped with the Ford Foundation grant of \$ 4,30,000 has been in existence from June 1963 ence from June, 1963.

4. Students under the programme

The General Education Programme was organised this year for the Faculties its, Commerce. Science (included) of Arts, Commerce, Science (including Pre-Medical), Home Science, Fine Arts and Technology and Engineering and Technology and Engineering. The Programme in each of these Faculties was offered to the first and second. was offered to the first and second year of the Three Year Degree Course.

5. Distribution of Courses

The following courses were offered:

- (1) Human Civilization,
- (2) Social, Political and Economic Problems of India,
- (3) Science and its Impact on Society,
- (4) Readings from Literature and Art Appreciation,
 - (5) On Values of Life.

The above General Education Courses are distributed over two years of the Degree Courses, though actual distribution of the courses would differ from Faculty to Faculty and from Class to Class.

The Advisory Committee for General Education in its meeting held on 15-2-1972 had appointed a Committee to prepare report on reorganising General Education programme and exploring how best it could be integrated in the pattern of Degree Courses. Pending that, the Committee felt that the pattern of present General Education programme be changed and that the Department may offer courses which are more utility oriented, the Department worked out the following Scheme of programme and offered a few of them during the year:

I Utility Courses:

(1) Plumbing, (2) Carpentry, (3) Wireman, (4) Spray-work, (5) Batic-work and (6) Clay-modelling etc. II Self-learning Courses:

Self-learning courses through audio-visual media could be organised along the following lines:



Educational tours could be organised keeping in mind the following:

(1) Know your faith, (2) Know your industries, (3) Know your people, (4) Know your surrounding (5) Know your planets, (6) Know your rivers and (7) Know your mountains, etc.

Inter-disciplinary comprehensive special write-ups of each place of visit could be prepared.

VI Practical Art Appreciation:

This programme could be organised on the following lines:

(1) Display of films and discussion on it, (2) Present drama and evaluate it, and (3) Exhibit art objects and assess them etc.

In addition to the above lectures on various topics of general and topical interest, as well as general discussions, could also be arranged.

6. Teaching Staff

The General Education Centre has a nucleus staff of nine teachers who not only teach General Education and the Pre-University Classes, but also serve as liaison and help in the preparation of reading material and organisation of the programme.

7. Library

The Centre has a separate library of its own. It has a stock of 2296 books of the value of Rs. 16,190-61. It continued to subscribe to 8 periodicals during the year:

1. Halls of Residence

The University being residential makes constant efforts to increase and improve residential accommodation for its students. At its start in 1949 the University had accommodation for 200 boys in rented buildings and another 200 boys in University owned buildings. There was no hostel accommodation for girl students. At the end of year 1972-73 there were eleven Halls for boys and four Halls for girl students. Two additional Halls for boys are under construction of which one would be ready for occupation by June 1973. The general policy of the University is to distribute students from various faculties in different Halls so that every Hall has students from different Faculties.

There is a good demand from students for residential accommodation in the University Halls of Residence. In order that the students may not be put to difficulties for searching accommodation in private houses in the city where the rents are exhorbitant and facilities are comparatively too less, the University has to continue the procedure of admitting 3 students in most of the room this year also. At the end of the year under report 2368 boys 844 girl students were in residence in different Halls as against 2313 boys and 854 girl students at the end of previous year. The statement showing the break up of these students by Halls and Institutions is given in Appendix XI.

In the Halls of Residence for boys there is one honorary Warden and in the girls' Hostel there is one paid full time Superintendent to look after the residents. The administration of the Halls was carried on with advice of the Advisory Committee of the Halls of Residence and of the Wardens' Committee. All the Halls have been provided with common rooms, generally used as Library-cum-Reading Room also. Indoor games are also provided in all Halls.

The Chief Warden's office has a Staff of 9 Class III and 2 Class IV employees. The Central Committee was formed and the following Sub-committees were also formed to work under it during the year under report. The Chief Warden, Halls of Residence is the President of the Central Committee. The following Sub-committees were formed:

- (1) Inter Hostel Food Committee

- (3) Inter Hostel Entertainment Committee

The Sports Committee arranged the Inter Hostel Competitions in different games. The Entertainment Committee organised the Inter Hostel Variety Entertainment programme.

2. University Health Centre


The staff of the Health Centre consisted of Medical Officer, 2 Honorary Physicians, Surgeon, Lady Gynaecologist, 2 Family Planning Doctors, 2 Family Planning Welfare Workers, Part-time Lady Doctor, Nurse, Sanitary Inspector, Compounder-cum-Clerk, Laboratory-cum-X-ray Technician, and 3 Hamal-cum-Sweepers.

The Health Centre provides preventive and curative services for the students, members of the staff and their families. The Medical Officer visits hostels every month twice, once planned and once by surprise for inspecting maintenance of sanitation and hygiene in hostels and kitchens.

The new entrants in the University were given a medical check-up by the Medical Inspection Board at S.S.G. Hospital. Out of the total 4911 entrant students schools 1.16 dents scheduled for medical check up 4051 (82.48%) reported. Out of total 4051 examined 1410 (34.80%) were recommended follow-up treatment to be taken either from the Health Centre, Specialists of the S.S.G. Hospital or from family doctors for various disorders viz. skin, eye, ear, nose, throat, heart etc. The information regarding the follow-up treatment has been available in case of 1054 (74.75%) students. On Miniature Chest X-ray examination of the students during the Medical check up 103 students were found suspicious of T.B. and called at the Health Centre for V rouse 11. Health Centre for X-ray and laboratory investigation. Out of these 103 students, 3 students were found on the students were found on the students. 3 students were found suffering from T.B. and sent to T.B. Hospital for treatment. They are now treatment. They are now improving. For the second medical check up 2607 students were called but the 2607 students were called but the response was poor.

The Mess servants were called at the Health Centre for their general medical check-up and were specially examined for infective and communicable diseases.

During the year the total attendance of the patients at the Health Centre was 32, 753 (22, 115 were stud Clinic was 32, 753 (22, 115 were students and 10, 638 were members of the year. and their families). The average of the patients at the Health Ceptaff and their families. and their families). The average daily attendance was 90 during the year.

The staff consisted of Director, 2 Senior Physical Instructors, 5 Physical Instructors, 3 Swimming Trainees, One Boating Trainer and One Clerk.

(2) Physical Training:

Physical Training was imparted to 3077 students (1911 men and 1166 women students).

During the year altogether 1191 members including outside institutions took advantage of Swimming Pool and 500 N.C.C. cadets and 34 Summer vacation members took advantage of Boat House.

(4) Training to University Teams:


